2009 African Letter

Dear Friends

2009 has been a very eventful year, at the beginning of the year fully retired, a leisurely breakfast, mid morning coffee on the



patio training 9/10 oclock depending on the weather and the mood, lunch on the patio, gym late afternoon before the 'workers' rush to the gym began and relaxed evenings. And now, at the end of 2009 getting up at the crack of dawn snatching 60 mins on the turbo or squeeze 45 mins in at the gym and then rush to the office, getting home 6/7 o clock, supper and to bed. Returning to live in the in the real world again! Given a choice, retirement wins hands down on all fronts!

The reason for the change, our business, Ted McDonald Real Estate situated in Queensburgh a suburb of Durban some 95ks from our retirement home in Howick, was supposedly sold to two Business Brokers from the company who had our business on the market for sale.

A long story but to say that after two and a bit years the business failed, leaving many debts including money owing to us, trust fund money missing and has given us no alternative but to return to Queensburgh for what has become a rescue operation. And like the property market in the UK, not at the best time.

As expected cycling and training have taken a back seat for the time being, as training on the roads during the week is a no no with the traffic congestion in and around town and the lack of driving skills of our African taxi drivers. I could train with the early morning riders at - 4.30am, but in my culture 4.30am is for sleeping!

Most weekends we go home to Howick so some Saturdays and Sundays road riding could be on the cards. Adjusting to the old way of life, pre-retirement, is not easy. Although we both remain healthy just a little more stressed than earlier in the year!

We have had a lot of changes in Durban during the past year. The local government, in their wisdom, have decided to rename streets and buildings after 'fallen heroes of the struggle'. So streets like NMR Avenue (Natal Mounted Rifles) named after Natal's own regiment who fought with honour during the 39-45 war has become Masabalala Yengwa Avenue, Edwin Swales VC Drive a freeway named after one of the few South Africans to be awarded the VC, awarded for having stayed with his aircraft whilst his crew bailed out, but too late to save himself, some two months before the end of the war, has now become Solomon Mahlangu Drive and a teen who bombed a shopping centre in Amanzimtoti killing five civilians and executed as a terrorist now has a main street in that town named after him.

Many of the names are unknown to vast amounts of the white population.

If we get lost in Durban the problem is remembering the new names of the buildings and streets and it can be further complicated by even if we do remember the new names is how to pronounce them in order to ask the way! We are also not sure if the changes are beneficial to all, a large slice of the white and Indian population have 'packed for Perth'. We also understand that there is a little South Africa in New Zealand where Judi's daughter and grandchildren stay.

One of the better saving graces for me at least is that with our paid TV we see all the top sports events of the world like hours of the Tour de France, Wimbledon, the Olympics, all UK Premier league soccer (being able to watch the Spurs every week is great) and top golf UK &US. Judi doesn't quite feel the same about all the sport, but then again we do get all the soapies and series, UK & US.

We are a country of mixed heritage heading in some directions to third world and in others to the modern culture of Europe and the US.

Certainly a vastly different South Africa to the one we emigrated to in 1971. When whites reigned supreme!

2010 we have the World Cup Soccer and although we have one of the highest unemployment figures in the world, we have spent billions on seven new stadiums, all magnificent master pieces, state of the arch and all that. Our major concern is will these become white elephants after the World Cup, anyway if and when we get the Olympics we will have the stadiums ready!

2010 could be our year in the world cup as South Africa ranked 85 in the world we could well be the surprise of the tournament. Watch this space and remember you read it here first!

A blessed Christmas and prosperous 2010 to you all.

Obriss Farm, Brasted, Kent

Sixteenth century farmhouse, in open farmland, now restored and owned by the Landmark Trust and available for rent as a holiday home.

Obriss Farm was built c.1550. As a rough guide this would be just after the Mary Rose sank (1545) and in the transition from the tudors with Henry VIII dying 1547, with Edward VI and Mary I taking brief turns before Elizabeth I became queen in 1558, so the property is basically Elizabethan. The farm was acquired by the Landmark Trust from Mrs Helena Cooper in 1990 and first open to guests in 1996. The original spelling, Oberice, from the original OS maps of 1819, persists in the Oberice Apiary.

Finding Obriss Farm:

- From the M25, follow the A25 and then turn off at Westerham, following signs for Chartwell and then going slightly further on.
- Chartwell was home for Sir Winston Churchill from 1924 until he died and is now a <u>National Trust</u> property
